
Helpful tips before you leave:

Life in Mumbai

Students will study at St. Xavier's College in Mumbai, one of the most well known colleges in India. Indian students from all over the country study here. The Media, Culture and Communications class is held at Xavier's Institute of Communications. Students will examine numerous Bollywood films to understand Indian culture. Some movies that will be viewed are Om Shanti Om, Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenge, as well as many others.

Students will share rooms together at the YMCA International House located in Central Mumbai. Breakfast, dinner, internet, and a laundry service are all provided. Taxis will be taken to navigate Mumbai and students will travel in trains and buses on weekend trips.

Elephanta caves

Elephanta Island is home to the Elephanta caves located about six miles from Mumbai. This World Heritage site has two groups of caves—five Hindu and two Buddhist. Many of the stone cut outs are dedicated to Shiva, a Hindu god. The caves have an unknown date and attribution, but archaeologists date them back to the 5th and 8th centuries.

Aurangabad

Aurangabad is a city close to the Ellora and Ajanta caves, both World Heritage sites. In Ellora there are thirty four caves excavated out of the Charanandri Hills. The caves represent three world religions within the temples. The first twelve are Buddhist, the next seventeen are Hindu, and the last five are Jain. They represent the harmony in religions between the fifth and tenth centuries in India. Not far from Aurangabad is the Bibi Ka Maqbara or more commonly known as the "Mini Taj Mahal" or the "Poor man's Taj". This amazing monument was built for the wife of the Mughal emperor Aurangazeb.

Pune

Pune, is located south of Mumbai. This city is home to the University of Pune, another well known university in India. Many open air markets and museums in Pune make this a great destination.

Goa

Goa is the smallest state in India and located south of Mumbai. Goa is known for its beaches, and because of that tourism is the focus by the coast. The beach environment makes this state laid back. Besides the beach Goa has an aquarium, markets, and old Portuguese lighthouses to explore.
