

Should calculus be taught differently? Can it? What topics are still relevant now that the computer is so widely available? Three separate committees of the MAA are now studying the role of calculus in the undergraduate curriculum. Interesting reading for those of you who have not yet seen it is the MAA publication <u>Towards a Lean and Lively Calculus</u>, the proceedings and papers written for and as a result of the special conference/workshop sponsored by the MAA to develop alternate curriculum and teaching methods for calculus at the college level. This publication is available from the MAA for the special conference is a college level.

Because of its relevance at this time, we have decided to focus on calculus and other parts of the undergraduate curriculum at the Fall meeting. Bill has arranged for two great speakers on this subject, Bernard Madison and Paul Zorn. In addition Howard Penn will give a minicourse on Friday afternoon on software use in Differential Equations. This is the same minicourse he will give in Atlanta at the national meeting. You have the unique opportunity to take it early, close to home, and at a reduced rate.
